WHO ARE WE?

The sign out front says "Castle Rock Christian Church" ... "I thought all churches were Christian" someone might say. Another might challenge, "Are you trying to say that you are Christian and no one else is?" Another person might query, "I've never really heard of you people before. What is a Christian Church all about?" These are frequent comments made by those who either drive by or have just wondered about Christian Churches. It is important to remember where one comes from.

As I get older and as the generations ahead of me begin to disappear, it becomes more important and fascinating to hear stories of my ancestors — I want to know where I came from.

Introduction

The stories of my ancestors explain what is necessary for my life. They tell me why I look the way I do, why I was born in a certain state, how my parents met, and other things that I consider to be important. This information helps me to know what I might be able to expect in the future.

Living in the United States we are constantly reminded of those who gave their lives so that we might have freedom. We hear about great men such as George Washington, Abraham Lincoln, John Adams, and others who contributed to what we now enjoy. We all need to know the struggle that took place to begin and preserve this great country. The "Restoration Movement" (as it is known) or congregations that are called "Christian Churches or Churches of Christ¹" are no different.

Discovering our past will give us direction for the future. Learning of noble people such as Barton Stone, Alexander Campbell, Thomas Campbell, Walter Scott and others will aid us in determining the heritage and possibly the future of the Castle Rock Christian Church.

Since the establishment of the Church on the Day of Pentecost, the Lord has always had those who were, and are, true to Him, although we realize that through time, the gospel has been altered, watered down, and even taken to totally unbiblical proportions by many kinds of churches who themselves have been deceived. The words of Matthew 16:18 were not spoken in vain by our Lord. The "gates of Hades" had not in the late 1700's, and have not yet, "prevailed against it [the Church]."

It was out of a time of religious confusion that what we call the Restoration Movement had its beginnings. Our pioneers saw that the Church that the Lord built was supposed to be one. They also realized that Christians had been splintered into many different denominations. As one of the founding fathers of the Restoration Movement, Thomas Campbell, said their aim was to "unite the Christians in all the sects [churches]." Their aim was to get people to accept the Bible as the only true guide and to leave behind their man-made creeds, practices and traditions that were not of the Scripture.

Some years ago, Dr. J. B. Phillips translated the New Testament for his young people. When the Epistles (letters to the churches) were first published, he wrote a preface, and in it he said: "The great difference between present-day Christianity and that of which we read in the letters is that to us it is primarily a performance, to them it was a real experience.... We are practically driven to accept their own explanation, which is that their little human lives had, through Christ, been linked up with the very Life of God... They still speak to us across the centuries. Perhaps if we believed what they believed, we might achieve what they achieved." (Letters to Young Churches, p. XIV)

Later on, Will Durant wrote, "If Christianity would go back to its origins, cleanse itself resolutely from the silt of time, and take its stand with fresh sincerity upon the personality and ideals of its founder, who could resist it?" ("The Crisis in Christianity" in the *Saturday Evening Post*, August 5, 1939).

I believe that there is still a great hunger for this kind of Christianity. There are hundreds of thousands who are sick of the narrowness of "churchiness," and the nominal Christianity we see represented in the media. People today hunger for a long breath of fresh air of the New Testament. What the Christian Churches, the Restoration Movement provides today is a call to come back to days of Pentecost and to fill the hunger, quench the thirst of the certainty of God and reveal the freedom and power of the newborn Church.

Those of the Christian Churches would say there is a recognizable "pattern" for the Church described in the Scriptures if we are careful to define "pattern" in terms of life rather than pure logic.

"Pattern" is not to be thought of as rigid impositions or set of understandings but rather is the order of which is found in a life-relationship that the Father and the Son share with believers. It is an experience of an exhibiting the Gospel, in real life.

I like what the old, revered professor, Dr. Dean E. Walker, said: "Restoration involves radical measures to recover whatever has been distorted or lost."

As a movement, our ultimate purpose is to win the world to Christ. Our immediate purpose is the unity of the Church (John 17). Our pressing purpose is to return to the original New Testament Christianity pattern.

This is what the Christian Churches are about. Will you join me and the many pastors, teachers, leaders, and founders in the mission we have believed in and lived for throughout the years? Will you join me in this worthy venture?

Constructing the History of Castle Rock Christian Church

This is a story of how the Gospel of Jesus Christ was planted in the community of Castle Rock through the Castle Rock Christian Church and how it became the first church in town and the first (restoration) Christian Church in the State of Washington. This is very much a story of God's keeping power over this small group of deeply committed believers over the past 150 years.

During this time the church has been proclaiming the message of Jesus Christ to Castle Rock and sending out members as missionaries to many countries in the world.

FINDING INFORMATION

Many of the records of our early history were lost due to fires and floods in the earlier years of the church. A good share of the information included in this history is the result of the computer age. It and the internet have allowed us the exciting ability to access information from almost anywhere in the world. We have found many nuggets of information that have long been hidden in forgotten files in some of the most surprising places. An example of this is the great discovery of several pictures of the old church that was located on 1st and C Street for so many years. Larry Morley sent them to the National Historical Society (Disciples of Christ), and we had no idea they even existed. For such a treasure we are thankful.

So look back and remember, as you embark on this literary and pictorial journey through the past 150 years of the Castle Rock Christian Church.
